
The evening included revision guidance, exam tips, coursework information and subject specific talks aimed at maximising exam success.

Year 8 students have been working on a project called Making and Breaking Rules, and they have created some still life collage work inspired by the Cubists.








Visual Music

Body Language 2024

There are many infectious things about Dance. One of its most inspiring qualities is the way that it brings people together, and we were able to celebrate the power of this at this year's Body Language performance.

Over 250 tickets sold, hours of committed rehearsals with students, and families enabling all of this to come together; it is a shared language that sparks curiosity and encourages collaboration. Dance continues to sit prominently as a foundation in our school community and this is a wonderful way to acknowledge the 28th year of Body Language.

On Monday 4th March the Body Language stage sprung to life with primary and secondary dancers from the Dartmoor Schools Sports Partnership launching the week with the 'Let's Dance' show. On Tuesday 5th March we welcomed Year 5 and 6 students from our feeder primary schools to the stage with a selection of seven dances inspired by musical theatre from the West End for Primary Body Language 2024. These two events alone saw over 400 young people sharing our stage and performing their choreography with passion and flair; just one example of exactly why the performing arts are so important within education and far beyond.

On Thursday 7th March an exciting and diverse programme of dance was performed by South Dartmoor dancers across KS3, 4 and 5. Dances were enriched with original movement inspired by a range of stimuli and professional dance, all of which has been explored through the Dance curriculum as well as the rich extracurricular provision we are proud to offer to our student body.

We are proud of so much that we do at South Dartmoor, particularly when we reflect on the huge number of live performance opportunities we offer our learning community. The growth and dedication from the performers of Body Language 2024 is

representative of the array of life skills they have developed by embracing the Body Language experience; it brings us great joy to play a part in their journey.

Every single dancer on the Body Language stage this year embodied our core values; Truth, Respect, Equality and Excellence. They feel a sense of belonging and investment within our community.

Thank you for supporting these young people and enabling them to share their excitement, hard work and creativity with confidence and pride. Body Language 2024 is our 'Thank You' to you all.



An Inspector Calls

J.B. Priestley's remarkable play about Edwardian England focuses on the class differences of the time.

Eva Smith has committed suicide, and an inspector visits the Birling family home during an engagement party. Our Year 10 GCSE Drama students' performance of Act 1 focused on the revelations that Mr. Birling, his daughter Sheila Birling and her fiancé Gerald Croft are all partly to blame for her death. Sheila is the bright hope; whilst being a typically spoilt rich young lady, she immediately recognises her guilt and is remorseful to the extent that in Act 2 she changes, representing a brave new future for the social divide evident in 1910 and in 1945 when the play was written.

The Year 10 students produced, directed and performed Act 1 of this advanced play, and whilst they did not perform Act 2 or 3, the rest of the characters, Eric Birling – the son, and Mrs. Birling, are also seen to be partly to blame. Whilst the drunk Eric is unpredictable it appears as though he too will change; whilst the others remain implacably fixed in their views and biases. Like Eva, Gerald's father is never seen in the play, but he represents the real evil in J.B. Priestley's view – class-based society.

The Year 10s independently produced, directed and acted in the play which they performed to a private audience in February. All the acting choices, setting, costumes, sound and lighting were their own, guided by two student directors.

The work was exceptional for students of this experience and age; they completely immersed themselves in the play, focusing on detail and the precise enactment of Edwardian people. The play has demanding language, concepts and some really long speeches – all of which the students excelled at. Their learning and progress in stagecraft has been astonishing.

Whilst very nervous, the students also performed to Year 11; a daunting prospect, but one which they took in their stride. They are a very special group and company, and they deserve every future success. They are hard-working and professional, and it has been a privilege to support their journey.



The Paper Birds

Year 10 GCSE Drama students went to the Northcott Theatre in Exeter to watch Feel Me by theatre company The Paper Birds.

The piece was about displaced people and included some difficult themes which were presented in a really engaging and thoughtprovoking way.

Our students were fantastic, and a member of the public commented on how exemplary their behaviour and engagement was.

We didn't get a photo of students outside the theatre because we were too busy chatting about how incredible the show was, and how inspired they were to apply some techniques to their own devised pieces that they are currently working on.



Isle of Arran

One February morning, whilst the South Dartmoor community was slumbering, cosy in their beds in the depths of the night, Year 12 geographers slipped off to start the annual field trip to the Isle of Arran.



Keenly awaiting the arrival of the 2:45am Falcon bus to Bristol Airport, excitement illuminated Drumbridges roundabout and the size of the merry throng scared the driver!

Clearing bag drop and security as quickly as possible, the boys found the allure of duty-free cologne irresistible whilst the girls refilled their water bottles. After a slightly lumpy flight, fifteen happy Sixth Form students descended the steps to Glasgow's tarmac in glorious sunshine and biting temperatures to find the local bus to take them to the fifth mode of transport; the train to Ardrossan Harbour, with the ferry still awaiting. All this before break time!

Finally, after 12 hours in transit and a journey that included cars, coaches, aeroplanes, local buses, trains and a ferry, they finally made it to their destination. Slightly windswept, a little bit jaded, but definitely impressed by the beauty of the island scenery and with only the wrangling of duvets/pillows into fresh bedding and the consumption of a hearty evening meal left on the to-do list, a good night's sleep was eagerly anticipated!

An extended session in the classroom reviewing field-sampling methods and strategies helped avoid the worst of the deluge and, with clouds breaking and sun sparkling on freshly fallen rain, the class set out to practice data collection on the Lochranza Saltmarsh before returning to the centre for self-made sandwiches at lunch.



The afternoon included the introduction of footpath impact studies and kite graph analysis. Beautiful weather, with a little taste of Winter as a backdrop.

After a hearty dinner, there was a well-focused evening classroom session to finish the day off.

Evenings in the student common room were equally structured with table tennis, pool and cards featuring highly as the class maximised away from home downtime.

On the morning of day two, heavy rain cleared to reveal the promised snow-capped peaks as a backdrop for a quick look at the polygenesis of the landscape and some glacial clast orientation research, before being whisked on to part two in the centre's two electric minibuses!

For the second half of day two, the weather returned to being more typically Scottish! Snowy peaks were shrouded in murky mist, making the sketching and note taking more tricky with soggy paper and imagined landscape views. However, spirits remained high, and the promise of a deluxe hot chocolate by the bus stop in a wonderful warm café spurred the troops on! The third and final day of the geography pilgrimage involved surveying the change in characteristics of settlements around the island. Fresh from the usual four-course breakfast, the team set off to survey Brodick, Lamlash, Blackwaterfoot and Lochranza.

















With dry feet and firm underfoot conditions, all enjoyed the opportunity to sample the delicacies offered by these semiurban environments by visiting a Co-op supermarket to restock on teenage-flavoured nosh. Plenty of new techniques learnt, both qualitative and quantitative, providing our young geographists with the skills to tackle the more subjective realm of human geography!

With one evening session left, delirium started to set in with the prospect of balmy, tropical Devon rain rising in the mind.

Leaving brings such sorrow, especially if you're a teenager needing to get up at 6am! The long hard days of crafting enquiry skills in the hills and survey techniques on the streets had swollen their brains as much as the fine catering had swollen Mr. Hodge's waistline.

Our fine young people had worked hard and with pride equal to the excellent impression they left on everyone they met. Bus

and taxi drivers, centre managers and tutors and, most importantly, the residents of the island all complemented their exemplary conduct and most friendly characters.

Thank you to the parents who entrusted us with their children, and the community who followed our progress on social media. We can't wait to take next year's group on this ultimate eyeopening adventure.







Dawlish Warren Trip

There is nothing that says Geography more than a good field trip to Dawlish Warren, and with the express dictate from the exam board's compulsory fieldwork requirement demanding that we go to the beach, we duly obliged.

Focusing on the geographical enquiry process rather than the overcast weather, students set about collecting quantitative and qualitative data to assess the effectiveness of the coastal management strategy on this Devon coastal treasure. All students worked hard to understand the collection methodology they were learning, and they were a credit to themselves with the way they carried out their workbook completion.

Lunchtime enabled them to sample the gastronomic delights of the Warren eateries and bask in the pre-ordered sunshine. This proved to be most relaxing, especially as there were very few seagulls around to bother the picnickers.

To round the day off our students walked to assess the gem of coastal erosion features; the Langstone Rock arch and caves. The field sketching of their view of the rock and surrounding coastal defences was swiftly completed with the promise of an up-close examination of processes of attrition and hydraulic action at the foot of the cliffs urging them on. The happy band of homeward bound students returned to the bus with a flourish of stone skimming and muttering of aching feet, field working honour satisfied.











World Book Day

Bank of England Visit


We were delighted to welcome Iain Ramsay, a managerial figure within the Bank of England Markets Directorate who is responsible for the oversight and analysis of financial market developments.
